Great North Wood

Fragments of a mighty woodland can still be found in south London. The Great North Wood gave rise to the names of local districts such as Norwood. Forest Hill and Penge. We're aiming to raise awareness of this historic woodland landscape and help enhance it for future generations to enjoy.



We run a range of projects to help boost wildlife and connect people to nature

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Keeping it Wild

Keeping it Wild is a new project, funded by Heritage Lottery Fund, that will empower and inspire 600 young people aged 11-25, from backgrounds currently under-represented in natural heritage, to gain vital skills while discovering, conserving and sharing their experiences of the capital's wild spaces.

Welsh Harp

Also known as Brent Reservoir, Welsh Harp is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) for its breeding pairs of great crested grebe, overwintering waterfowl, and marginal vegetation. London Wildlife Trust is now working to protect and enhance this unique series of habitats.

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Water for Wildlife

This project focuses on London's freshwater habitats - discovering what's living in them, and encouraging more wildlife to do so. We are monitoring and mapping these waterways, making practical conservation improvements to key sites and strengthening their wildlife value.

Thousands of birds, insects and other animals across London are finding it harder to survive because their habitats, and the green spaces that we share with them, are disappearing. Lost Effra

Lost Effra is a project that empowers communities along a stretch of culverted river to create new green landscape features. Our aim is to increase local resilience to flooding and the changing climate, while also improving neighbourhoods for people and wildlife.

Natural Estates

Enhancing and maintaining common green spaces around housing estates, improving their physical and emotional health, social cohesion and promoting active citizenship.

New River at 400

A programme of walks and events to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the New River.

New Roots

Engaging ex-offenders in practical horticulture and conservation activities, helping them pick up new skills.

Potted History

Making use of reminiscence and horticultural therapy to improve the self-confidence and wellbeing of socially isolated older people in south London.

Tump 53 - Wild about Thamesmead

Tump 53 is a former munitions testing site which is now a beautiful nature reserve in the heart of Thamesmead in south-east London.

Urban Urchins

London's hedgehogs are in trouble, with the city's population falling by nearly a third in ten years. We're now calling on everyone in London to help us reverse this shocking decline, and ensure our hedgehogs can continue to live in the city for decades to come.

Vole Patrol

We launched Vole Patrol to investigate how small mammals such as mice, shrew and vole are faring at selected woodland habitats in west London. The findings have helped increase awareness of these species and informed future conservation efforts.

Wandle Estates

Rrevitalising south London's River Wandle as an identifiable, high-quality natural asset for local communities.

Water Vole Conservation

Dedicated to the conservation of water vole throughout Greater London.

Wild at Heart

Encouraging communities to become actively involved in looking after, improving and enjoying their local park.
