- children trafficked.

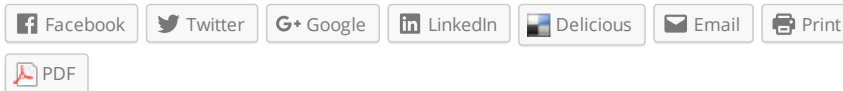
Some were born this way, became this way, or were victims of abuse.
