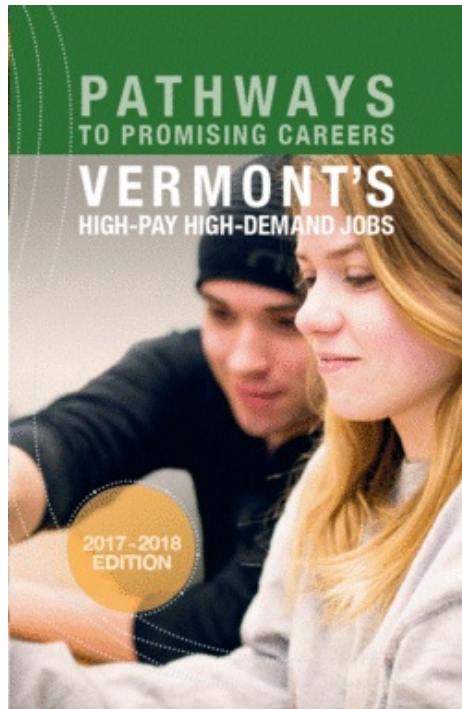




Pathways to Promising Careers



Are you a Vermont student or graduate considering your career path? You should know which careers show the most promise.

We've identified 54 high-pay, high-demand jobs projected for the state. Each job pays a median wage of at least \$20/hour and is projected to have at least 100 openings in the state between 2014 and 2024. Elements of the education and training pathways for each job can be obtained in Vermont.
